Minutes

April 13, 2023

Commissioners present: William Bateson, Timothy Bechtol and Michael Pepple.

Also Present: Christine Carrigan, Cindy Land, Phil Johnson, Auditor Charity Rauschenberg, Adam Witteman, Steve Wilson and Jaclynn Hohman.

Commissioner Bateson opened the meeting at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' 1st floor conference room. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes from the April 11, 2023, meeting was read with Michael Pepple making a motion to approve, William Bateson seconded. Motion passed 2-0.

Michael Pepple made the motion and William Bateson seconded to approve three Warrant Journals. Motion passed 2-0.

The Assistant Clerk presented the following resolutions for consideration:

Resolution #247-23 - Transfer of funds from Job & Family Services Fund #2015 to Children Services Fund #2023. Michael Pepple made a motion to approve, William Bateson seconded. Motion passed 2-0.

Cindy Land presented the following resolution for consideration:

Resolution #248-23 – Resolution authorizing Amendment to Resolution No. 244-23 for the Hancock County Commissioners to enter into a contract with Edward L. Myers, Inc., Findlay, OH for flooring at the Hancock County Justice Center. Cindy stated this amendment is due to not adding in all of the aspects of the work to be completed on the jail floor. This change will add an additional \$5,900, for a total of \$32,000.00, not \$26,100.00. Michael Pepple made a motion to approve, William Bateson seconded. Motion passed 2-0.

Phil Johnson presented the following resolution for consideration:

Resolution #249-23 – Authorization to transfer to the City of Findlay certain real properties located within the City of Findlay, which had been acquired for flood mitigation purposes. Phil stated this resolution will authorize the transfer of parcels that are located in the area of the second benching project to the City of Findlay. This will not involve any monetary transfer. Commissioner Bateson inquired if all of the deed restrictions are in place. Phil stated the deed restrictions will be in place on the deed when it is signed. Michael Pepple made a motion to approve, Timothy Bechtol seconded. Motion passed 3-0.

Phil Johnson requested an executive session in regards to potential real estate sale and purchase.

Discussion took place regarding the General Fund balance and borrowing with Auditor, Charity Rauschenberg. She stated she will be sending the Commissioners the General Fund revenue activity, appropriations and expenditures for the end of March. She explained that due to timing and allocations the top two revenue lines look lower, but as a whole the General fund brought in more revenue than prior years. Charity stated the Indigent Defense funds are coming in slower than last year. Discussion took place regarding the amount the Commissioners want to borrow for the new judicial center. Commissioner Bechtol explained that we are receiving sub-contractor bids for the self-performed work today and

tomorrow. This information will be sent to Alvada Construction for them to use in the calculation of the guaranteed maximum price of the new judicial center. The Commissioners should receive the guaranteed maximum price on Monday. Commissioner Bechtol stated we can discuss the guaranteed maximum price at next Tuesday's meeting. In addition, we will be able to tell you what we potentially need to borrow. Charity stated she wants to stay in front of anything that can be funded or financed, because we cannot look backwards with resolutions for some of these projects. Charity stated that with all the projects the Commissioners have in place, it feels tight in the Auditor's office. Commissioner Bechtol inquired if the change order documentation for the JFS building is sufficient enough. Charity stated her office will be working on that this week. Commissioner Bechtol stated as soon as we receive that back, Delventhal can begin work out there.

Steve Wilson had nothing to report.

Jaclynn Hohman stated that the city is reviewing all of the other properties that were acquired by the county, and the Mayor hopes to get a list to the Commissioners in the next few weeks.

Meetings/Reports

Michael Pepple had nothing to report.

Timothy Bechtol stated we are looking forward to the bids coming in today and tomorrow from Alvada Construction and the sub-contractors.

William Bateson attended the Public Defenders Board meeting. The Public Defender reimbursement from the state has dropped to seventy percent. They will be looking at things very conservatively to keep their cost down. They are hoping the reimbursement will go to ninety percent with the new biannual budget.

At 9:50 a.m., William Bateson made a motion to enter into executive session in regards to potential real estate sale and purchase. William Bateson seconded. A roll call vote resulted as follows: William Bateson, yes; Timothy Bechtol, yes; Michael Pepple, yes. At 10:02 a.m., William Bateson made a motion to come out of executive session, in regards to potential real estate sale and purchase with no action taken. Timothy Bechtol seconded. Motion passed 3-0.

At 10:00 a.m., the Commissioner's met with Courtney Comstock. Christine Carrigan and Cindy Land were also in attendance. Courtney presented to the Commissioners the current revenues for materials. She stated the amount of material is down from last year. She stated they are losing material vendors due to the placement and size of the Litter Landing location. Courtney stated since the weather is nice, the public traffic has increased. The household hazardous waste program kicked off a couple of weeks ago. Discussion took place regarding the incident at the recycling facility in Indiana. Due to the upcoming Red Cross program, implementing new smoke detectors with lithium batteries, Commissioner Bechtol inquired what happens to those lithium batteries when they are no longer working. Courtney stated they will be added to the household hazardous waste invoice. Courtney also presented to the Commissioners a report of areas of concern with the current facility. She went over a few of the items on the report. She stated she is currently dealing with some staffing issues.

At 10:16 a.m., William Bateson made a motion to enter into executive session in regards to potential litigation. William Bateson seconded. A roll call vote resulted as follows: William Bateson, yes; Timothy

Bechtol, yes; Michael Pepple, yes. At 10:22 a.m., William Bateson made a motion to come out of executive session, in regards to potential litigation with no action taken. Timothy Bechtol seconded. Motion passed 3-0.

At 1:43 p.m., the Commissioners reconvened to sign a letter to send to Mayor Muryn regarding the Commissioners' priorities for the flood mitigation fund. In addition, the letter states the Commissioners are willing to fund the engineering project for the State Route 68/State Route15 interchange. Commissioner Bateson announced the Tuesday, April 18, 2023 meeting will be at 2:30 p.m.
